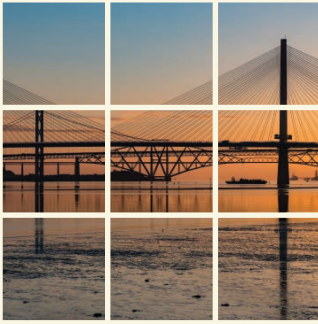

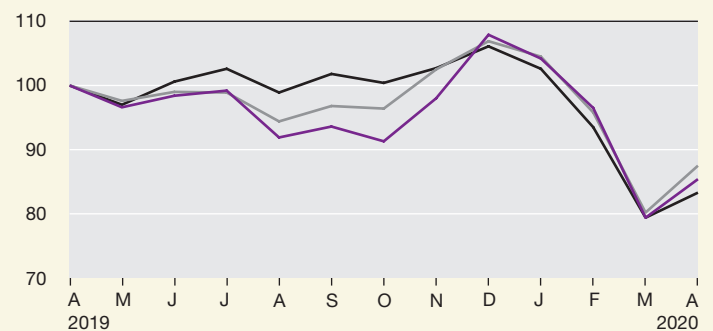

(figures rebased to 100 at 30 April 2019)

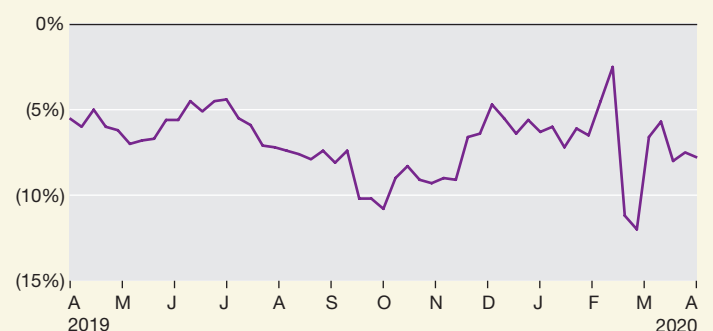

Chairman's Statement

Covid-19

In these uncertain times, my fellow Directors and I would like to take this opportunity to extend our thoughts to all affected by recent events, and our gratitude to those working tirelessly for the benefit of all.

Your Board has been monitoring how the Managers and other service providers have been responding to developments and has sought assurances that, operationally, they are acting responsibly towards their employees whilst maintaining appropriate standards of service to the Company. The portfolio managers in turn have continued to seek similar assurances from the companies held in the portfolio.

Annual General Meeting ('AGM')

It is intended that the Company's AGM will be held on Wednesday 5 August 2020 at 12.00 noon at the offices of Baillie Gifford, 1 Greenside Row, Edinburgh, EH1 3AN. Whilst normally inviting shareholders to attend, this doesn't seem possible at the current time, so shareholders are encouraged to submit their votes by proxy rather than attempt to do so in person. The meeting itself will involve the minimum number of people necessary for it to be quorate so anyone not authorised to attend will be declined entry for health reasons. Should the situation change, further information will be made available through the Company's website at www.bgukgrowthfund.com and the London Stock Exchange regulatory news service.

Performance

For the year to 30 April 2020, the Company's net asset value ('NAV') total return (capital and income) was negative 12.5% compared to a negative 16.7% for the FTSE All-Share Index total return.

The Company's share price total return over the same period was negative 14.6%. Whilst disappointing to see a fall in value, it is good to see our quality portfolio outperforming the broader market in these difficult times.

The longer term prospects for our companies look exciting. The Managers' review on pages 10 and 11 highlights some of the interesting developments in the portfolio as well as some of the issues faced.

Stewardship

As long-term 'actual' investors, the portfolio managers' focus is on promoting the best long-term performance outcomes for the businesses in which they invest, actively engaging with companies on those issues which could impact their long-term potential and supporting actions which they believe will maximise returns in future years. As part of the investment research process, consideration is given to relevant environmental, social and governance issues and the impact these may have on future returns.

The portfolio managers invest in companies at different stages in their evolution and across different industries and are wary of prescriptive policies and rules, believing that these can run counter to thoughtful and beneficial corporate stewardship. The approach adopted therefore favours a small number of simple stewardship principles which help shape interactions with companies. These principles, along with their core investment principles, are set out on page 9.

Share Buy-backs and Issuance from Treasury

No shares were bought back during the year to 30 April 2020. At the forthcoming AGM, the Board will ask shareholders to renew the mandate to repurchase up to 14.99% of the outstanding shares. The share buy-back policy seeks to operate in the best interests of shareholders by taking into account the relative level of the Company's share price discount to NAV when compared with peer group trusts, the absolute level of discount, volatility in the level of discount and the impact from share buy-back activity on the long-term liquidity of the Company's issued shares.

The Board also believes that the Company benefits from the flexibility of being able to re-issue any shares that might be held in treasury and is therefore looking to renew the annual issuance authority. At present there are 10,396,700 shares, 6.9% of the Company's issued share capital as at 30 April 2020, held in treasury. To avoid any dilution to existing investors, these would only be re-issued at a premium to NAV and after associated costs.

Gearing

During the year, the Company replaced its Scotiabank £35 million revolving one year credit facility with a £20 million revolving credit loan facility with National Australia Bank. This new facility contains the option to increase the amount borrowed to £35 million. No borrowings were drawn in the period and this continues to be the position.

The Board sets internal guidelines for the portfolio managers' use of gearing which are altered from time to time but are subject to net effective gearing not representing more than 20% of shareholders' funds.

Earnings and Dividends

The net revenue return per share for the year was 3.75p, versus 5.12p in 2019. A final dividend of 3.10p per share, payable on 12 August 2020 to shareholders on the register as at 10 July 2020, is being recommended. Shareholders should not rely on receiving a regular or growing level of income from the Company as its priority is capital growth. Any dividend paid will be by way of a single final payment and the Board expects that such dividends would represent approximately the minimum permissible to maintain investment trust status.

Diversity Policy

The Board believes that maintaining a diversity of thought and experience on the Board, and at an operational level within Baillie Gifford, represents the best way of discharging its responsibilities to shareholders. In furtherance of this belief, the Board will look for the best ways to increase the diversity of gender, ideas, professional experiences and cultural backgrounds to which the Company is exposed.

The Board will continue to monitor diversity on an ongoing basis, having regard to developments in Corporate Governance Code and wider market practice, and seek to ensure that the Company retains the benefits of a diversity of thought and experience going forward. As circumstances allow, the Company will continue to look for opportunities to broaden the diversity to which the Company is exposed, in furtherance of this commitment.

Financial Conduct Authority ('FCA') Value Assessment

Shareholders might be aware that new FCA rules require Alternative Investment Fund Managers to assess the overall value that their authorised unit trusts and open-ended funds deliver to investors. Although these rules do not apply to investment trusts, it should be noted that, over the course of the Company's financial year, the Company's Committees and Board assessed various costs levied by third party service providers as well as the Managers and Secretaries, and the quality of service received. I can therefore report that at present it is the Board's view that charges levied by third parties and the Managers and Secretaries are reasonable.

Outlook

The long-term ramifications of Covid-19 on the UK and global economies are unknown, but it is likely that in the short-term the trading environment for many companies will be exceptionally challenging. On top of this, whilst the UK has left the European Union, the risks of a disorderly Brexit remain high.

The Board and Managers have attempted to consider the implications of such matters sensibly and dispassionately and remain convinced that exceptional UK growth companies are still able to exploit their competitive strengths over the long-term and take advantage of the opportunities that follow severe economic dislocation. Patient investors should, therefore, be rewarded in due course.

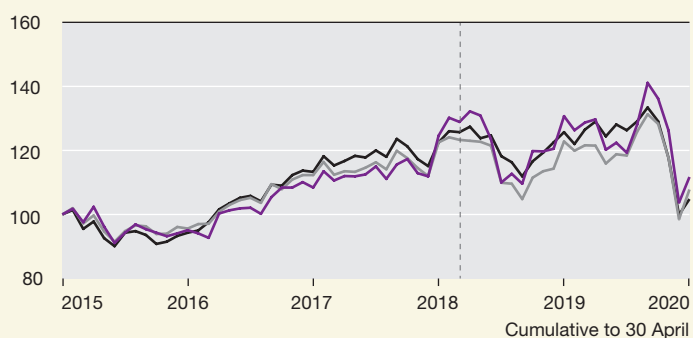

(figures rebased to 100 at 30 April 2015)

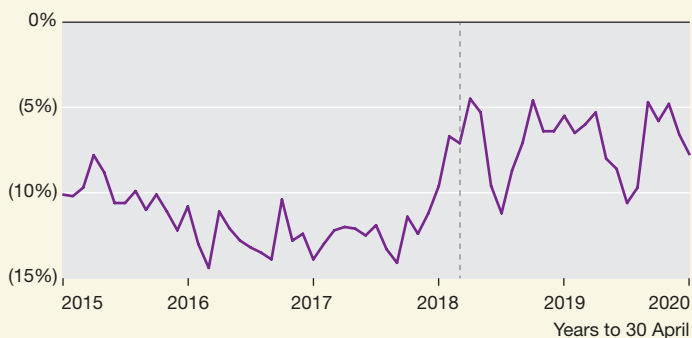

(figures plotted on a monthly basis)

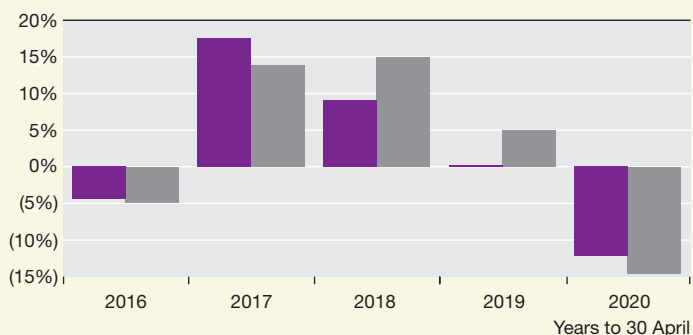

Annual Net Asset Value and Share Price Total Returns*

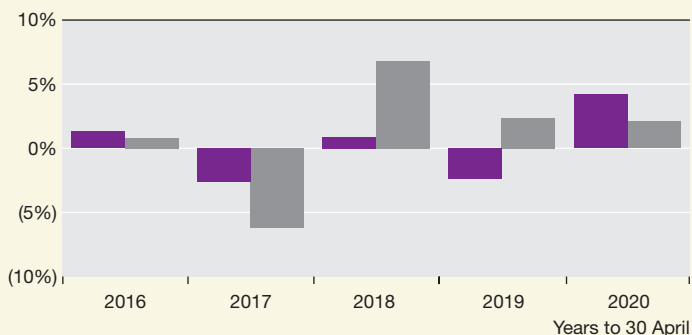

Business Review

Business Model

Business and Status

Baillie Gifford UK Growth Fund plc ('the Company') is a public company limited by shares and is incorporated in England. The Company is an investment company within the meaning of section 833 of the Companies Act 2006 and carries on business as an investment trust. Investment trusts are UK public listed companies and their shares are traded on the London Stock Exchange. They invest in a portfolio of assets in order to spread risk. The Company has a fixed share capital, although, subject to shareholder approval sought annually, it may purchase its own shares or issue shares. The price of the Company's shares is determined, like other listed shares, by supply and demand. The Company has been approved as an investment trust by HM Revenue & Customs subject to the Company continuing to meet the eligibility conditions. The Directors are of the opinion that the Company has continued to conduct its affairs so as to enable it to comply with the ongoing requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011.

The Company is an Alternative Investment Fund (AIF) for the purposes of the EU Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive.

Investment Objective

The principal investment objective of the Company is to achieve capital growth predominantly from investment in UK equities, with the aim of providing a total return in excess of the FTSE All-Share Index.

Investment Policy

The Company invests in a relatively concentrated portfolio of between 35 and 65 stocks principally selected for their potential to provide shareholders with attractive returns relative to the FTSE All-Share Index. The portfolio is invested primarily in listed UK equities. It may, if appropriate, include convertible securities, and equity-related derivatives may be used for efficient portfolio management purposes. The yield on the Company's investment portfolio is of secondary importance.

The stocks are predominantly constituents of the FTSE 350 Index.

The size of individual stock holdings depends on the Managers' degree of conviction, not the stock's weight in any index.

Performance

At each Board meeting, the Directors consider a number of performance measures to assess the Company's success in achieving its objectives.

Key Performance Indicators

The key performance indicators (KPIs) used to measure the progress and performance of the Company over time are established industry measures and are as follows:

- the movement in net asset value total return per ordinary share relative to the benchmark total return over the longer term;
- the movement in the share price total return relative to the benchmark total return over the longer term;
- the absolute level of movement in the net asset value total return over the longer term;

- the absolute level of movement in the share price total return over the longer term;
- the premium/discount of the share price to the net asset value per share;
- management fee; and
- ongoing charges.

An explanation of these measures can be found in the Glossary of Terms and Alternative Performance Measures on pages 55 and 56.

The one, five and ten year records of the KPIs can be found on pages 4, 5 and 14.

In addition to the above, the Board considers peer group comparative performance.

Borrowings

The Company has a one year £20 million unsecured revolving credit loan facility with National Australia Bank which is due to expire on 8 July 2020. At 30 April 2020, there were no outstanding drawings. Negotiations are underway to extend this facility for a further year with National Australia Bank.

Principal Risks

As explained on pages 21 and 22 there is an ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the risks faced by the Company on a regular basis. The Directors have carried out a robust assessment of the principal and emerging risks facing the Company, including those that would threaten its business model, future performance, solvency or liquidity. A description of these risks and how they are being managed or mitigated is set out below:

Financial Risk – the Company's assets consist of listed securities and its principal and emerging risks are therefore market related and include market risk (comprising currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk), liquidity risk and credit risk. An explanation of those risks and how they are managed is contained in note 18 to the Financial Statements on pages 45 to 47. The Board has, in particular, considered the impact of heightened market volatility since the coronavirus outbreak. To mitigate this risk the Board considers at each meeting various portfolio metrics including individual stock performance, the composition and diversification of the portfolio by sector, purchases and sales of investments and the top and bottom contributors to performance. The Managers provide rationale for stock selection decisions. A strategy meeting is held annually.

Investment Strategy Risk – pursuing an investment strategy to fulfil the Company's objective which the market perceives to be unattractive or inappropriate, or the ineffective implementation of an attractive or appropriate strategy, may lead to reduced returns for shareholders and, as a result, a decreased demand for the Company's shares. This may lead to the Company's shares trading at a widening discount to their net asset value. To mitigate this risk, the Board regularly reviews and monitors: the Company's objective and investment policy and strategy; the investment portfolio and its performance; the level of discount/premium to net asset value at which the shares trade; and movements in the share register.

Discount Risk – the discount/premium at which the Company's shares trade relative to its net asset value can change. The risk of a widening discount is that it may undermine investor confidence in the Company. To manage this risk, the Board monitors the level of discount/premium at which the shares trade and the Company has authority to buy back its existing shares when deemed by the Board to be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders.

Regulatory Risk – failure to comply with applicable legal and regulatory requirements such as the tax rules for investment trust companies, the UKLA Listing Rules and the Companies Act could lead to suspension of the Company's Stock Exchange listing, financial penalties, a qualified audit report or the Company being subject to tax on capital gains. To mitigate this risk, Baillie Gifford's Business Risk, Internal Audit and Compliance Departments provide regular reports to the Audit Committee on Baillie Gifford's monitoring programmes. Major regulatory change could impose disproportionate compliance burdens on the Company. In such circumstances representation is made to ensure that the special circumstances of investment trusts are recognised. Shareholder documents and announcements, including the Company's published Interim and Annual Report and Financial Statements, are subject to stringent review processes, and procedures are in place to ensure adherence to the Transparency Directive and the Market Abuse Directive with reference to inside information.

Custody and Depositary Risk – safe custody of the Company's assets may be compromised through control failures by the Depositary, including cyber security incidents. To mitigate this risk, the Audit Committee receives six monthly reports from the Depositary confirming safe custody of the Company's assets held by the Custodian. Cash and portfolio holdings are independently reconciled to the Custodian's records by the Managers. The Custodian's audited internal controls reports are reviewed by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department and a summary of the key points is reported to the Audit Committee and any concerns investigated. In addition, the existence of assets is subject to annual external audit.

Operational Risk – failure of Baillie Gifford's systems or those of other third party service providers could lead to an inability to provide accurate reporting and monitoring or a misappropriation of assets. To mitigate this risk, Baillie Gifford has a comprehensive business continuity plan which facilitates continued operation of the business in the event of a service disruption (including any disruption resulting from the coronavirus outbreak) or major disaster. Since the introduction of the Covid-19 restrictions, almost all Baillie Gifford staff have been working from home and operations have continued largely as normal. The Board reviews Baillie Gifford's Report on Internal Controls and the reports by other key third party providers are reviewed by Baillie Gifford on behalf of the Board. The other key third party service providers have not experienced significant operational difficulties affecting their respective services to the Company.

Leverage Risk – the Company may borrow money for investment purposes (sometimes known as 'gearing' or 'leverage'). If the investments fall in value, any borrowings will magnify the impact of this loss. If borrowing facilities are not renewed, the Company may have to sell investments to repay borrowings. To mitigate this

risk, all borrowing facilities require the prior approval of the Board and leverage levels are discussed by the Board and Managers at every meeting. Covenant levels are monitored regularly. The Company's investments are in listed securities that are readily realisable. Further information on leverage can be found on page 54 and in the Glossary of Terms and Alternative Performance Measures on pages 55 and 56.

Political Risk – political developments are monitored and considered by the Board as they occur, such as the departure of the UK from the European Union on 31 January 2020, and to assess the political consequences for the Company's future activities.

Viability Statement

Notwithstanding that the continuation of the Company is subject to approval by shareholders every five years, with the next vote at the Annual General Meeting in 2024, the Directors have, in accordance with provision 31 of the UK Corporate Governance Code, assessed the prospects of the Company over a five year period. The Directors continue to believe this period to be appropriate as it reflects the Company's longer term investment strategy and to be a period during which, in the absence of any adverse change to the regulatory environment and to the tax treatment afforded to UK investment trusts, they do not expect there to be any significant change to the current principal risks facing the Company nor to the effectiveness of the controls employed to mitigate those risks. Furthermore, the Directors do not reasonably envisage any change in strategy or any events which would prevent the Company from operating over a period of five years.

In considering the viability of the Company, the Directors have conducted a robust assessment of each of the principal risks and uncertainties detailed on pages 6 and 7 and in particular the impact of market risk where a significant fall in UK equity markets would adversely impact the value of the investment portfolio. The Company's investments are listed and readily realisable and can be sold to meet its liabilities as they fall due. The Directors have also considered the Company's leverage and liquidity in the context of the unsecured revolving credit loan facility of £20 million expiring in July 2020, which was undrawn at 30 April 2020 and remains undrawn as at 18 June 2020. Specific leverage and liquidity stress testing was conducted during the year, including consideration of the risk of further market deterioration resulting from the coronavirus outbreak. The stress testing did not indicate any matters of concern. In addition, all of the key operations required by the Company are outsourced to third party service providers and it is reasonably considered that alternative providers could be engaged at relatively short notice where necessary. The Board has specifically considered the UK's departure from the European Union on 31 January 2020 and can see no scenario that it believes would affect the going concern status or viability of the Company.

Based on the Company's processes for monitoring revenue projections and operating costs, share price discount/premium, the Managers' compliance with the investment objective, asset allocation, the portfolio risk profile, leverage, counterparty exposure, liquidity risk, financial controls and the Managers' operational resilience, the Directors have concluded that there is a reasonable expectation that the Company will be able to continue in operation and meet its liabilities as they fall due over the next five years.

Section 172 Statement

Under section 172 of the Companies Act 2006, the directors of a company must act in the way they consider, in good faith, would be most likely to promote the success of the company for the benefit of its members as a whole, and in doing so have regard (amongst other matters and to the extent applicable) to:

- (a) the likely consequences of any decision in the long-term;
- (b) the interests of the company's employees;
- (c) the need to foster the company's business relationships with suppliers, customers and others;
- (d) the impact of the company's operations on the community and the environment;
- (e) the desirability of the company maintaining a reputation for high standards of business conduct; and
- (f) the need to act fairly as between members of the company.

In this context and having regard to the Company being an externally-managed investment company with no employees, the Board considers that the Company's key stakeholders are its existing and potential new shareholders, its externally-appointed managers (Baillie Gifford) and other professional service providers (corporate broker, registrar, auditors and depository), lenders, wider society and the environment.

Great importance is placed by the Board on communication with shareholders and the Annual General Meeting provides the key forum for the Board and Managers to present to shareholders on the performance of the Company and on the future plans/prospects for the Company (see Notice of Meeting on page 48). It also allows shareholders the opportunity to meet with the Board and Managers and to raise questions and concerns. This year, regrettably it is looking likely that this will not be possible in person, nevertheless strong emphasis is placed on ensuring that shareholders still have the opportunity to ask questions of the Board and Managers (see page 48). The Chairman is available to meet with shareholders as appropriate and the Managers meet regularly with shareholders and their respective representatives, reporting back on views to the Board. Shareholders may also communicate with the Board at any time by writing to them at the Company's registered office or to the Company's broker. These communication opportunities help inform the Board when considering how best to promote the success of the Company for the benefit of all shareholders over the long-term.

The Board seeks to engage with its managers and other service providers in a collaborative and collegiate manner, with open and respectful discussion and debate being encouraged, whilst also ensuring that appropriate and regular challenge is brought and evaluation is conducted. The aim of this approach is to enhance service levels and strengthen relationships with the Company's providers with a view to ensuring the interests of the Company's shareholders and other stakeholders are best served by keeping cost levels proportionate and competitive, by maintaining the highest standards of business conduct and by upholding the Company's values.

Whilst the Company's operations are limited (with all substantive operations being conducted by the Company's third party service providers), the Board is keenly aware of the need to consider the impact of the Company's investment strategy and policy on wider society and the environment. The Board considers that its oversight

of environmental, social and governance (ESG) matters is an important part of its responsibility to all stakeholders and that proper consideration of ESG factors sits naturally with the Company's long-term approach to investment. The Board's approach to matters of diversity is set out on page 21.

The Board recognises the importance of keeping the interests of the Company's shareholders, and of acting fairly between them, firmly front of mind in its key decision making and the Company Secretaries are at all times available to the Board to ensure that suitable consideration is given to the range of factors to which the Directors should have regard. In addition to ensuring that the Company's stated investment objective was being pursued, key decisions and actions during the year which have required the Directors to have regard to applicable section 172 factors include:

- at the Company's Annual General Meeting held in August 2019, shareholders voted overwhelmingly in favour of continuing the life of the Company for a further five year period, with over 99.99% of votes cast in favour of continuation; and
- in July 2019, the Company replaced its Scotiabank £35 million revolving one year credit facility with a £20 million revolving credit loan facility with National Australia Bank, with the option to increase borrowings to £35 million via an accordion facility.

Employees, Human Rights and Community Issues

The Board recognises the requirement to provide information about employees, human rights and community issues. As the Company has no employees, all its Directors are non-executive and all its functions are outsourced, there are no disclosures to be made in respect of employees, human rights and community issues. Further information on the Company's approach to environmental, social and governance (ESG) matters is provided on page 23.

Gender Representation

The Board comprises four Directors, one female and three male. The Company has no employees. The Board's policy on diversity is set out on page 21.

Environmental, Social and Governance Policy

Details of the Company's policy on socially responsible investment can be found under Corporate Governance and Stewardship on page 23.

The Company considers that it does not fall within the scope of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and it is not, therefore, obliged to make a slavery and human trafficking statement. In any event, the Company considers its supply chains to be of low risk as its suppliers are typically professional advisers. A statement by the Managers under the Act has been published on the Managers' website at www.bailliegifford.com.

Future Developments of the Company

The outlook for the Company for the next 12 months is set out in the Chairman's Statement on pages 2 and 3 and the Managers' Report on pages 10 and 11.

The Managers' Core Investment Principles

Investment Philosophy

The following are the three core principles underpinning our investment philosophy. We have a consistent, differentiated long-term investment approach to managing UK equities that should stand investors in the Company in good stead:

Growth

We search for the few companies which have the potential to grow substantially and profitably over many years. Whilst we have no insight into the short-term direction of a company's share price, we believe that, over the longer term, those companies which deliver above average growth in cash flows will be rewarded with above average share price performance and that the power of compounding is often under-appreciated by investors. Successful investments will benefit from a rising share price and also from income accumulated over long periods of time.

Patience

Great growth companies are not built in a day. We firmly believe that investors need to be patient to fully benefit from the scale of the potential. Our investment time horizon, therefore, spans decades rather than quarters and our portfolio turnover, at 5.4%, is significantly below the UK industry average. This patient, long-term approach affords a greater chance for the superior growth and competitive traits of companies to emerge as the dominant influence on their share prices and allows compounding to work in the investors' favour.

Active Investment Management

It is our observation that many investors pay too much attention to the composition of market indices and active managers should make meaningful investments in their best ideas regardless of the weightings of the index. For example, we would never invest in a company just because it is large or to reduce risk. As a result, shareholders should expect the composition of the portfolio to be significantly different from the benchmark. This differentiation is a necessary condition for delivering superior returns over time and shareholders should be comfortable tolerating the inevitable ups and downs in short-term relative performance that will follow from that.

Portfolio construction flows from the investment beliefs stated above.

The Managers' Stewardship Principles

We have a responsibility to behave as supportive and constructively engaged long-term investors. Our approach favours a small number of simple principles which help shape our interactions with companies:

Prioritisation of long-term value creation

We encourage company management and their boards to be ambitious and focus their investments on long-term value creation.

Sustainable business practices

We look for companies to act as responsible corporate citizens, working within the spirit and not just the letter of the laws and regulations that govern them.

Fair treatment of stakeholders

We believe it is in the long-term interests of companies to maintain strong relationships with all stakeholders, treating employees, customers, suppliers, governments and regulators in a fair and transparent manner.

A constructive and purposeful board

We believe that boards play a key role in supporting corporate success and representing the interests of minority shareholders.

Long-term focused remuneration with stretching targets

We look for remuneration policies that are simple, transparent and reward superior strategic and operational endeavour.

Managers' Report

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic will likely be felt for some years to come. It has had tragic consequences for many families to-date whilst also shining a light on a number of professions that historically have always worked tirelessly for the good of society without the deserved recognition. We extend our sympathies to those that have suffered bereavement and our thanks to those vital workers that have carried out their duties in exceptionally difficult times. Considering the current tragic backdrop, it seems rather trivial to remind people that investment for the long-term remains our core professional focus, assimilating events and considering the implications for the portfolio, but professionally this is what we must do.

Although one can never say never, when writing future reports, we think it will be hard to match the events of the 12 months to 30 April 2020 for escalating drama. In the interim report we referred to the first half of the financial year as 'tumultuous' with Brexit negotiations and global trade war concerns dominating headlines. So how on earth can one describe the events of the second half? Firstly, a snap UK election resulting in a surprisingly large Conservative majority that initially cheered markets and directly led to 'Brexit' actually happening, with the UK leaving the European Union at the end of January. But even those historic events were in turn superseded by the coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic that led to most countries in the world forcing their citizens into lockdown and a collapse in economic activity. The UK stock market, in particular, suffered in this latter phase and, as the Chairman noted in her report, we ended in negative territory for the year.

Rather than speculate and blether on (a Scottish phrase) at length about the consequences of current events where the most intellectually honest, if slightly unsatisfactory, response to fellow shareholders is 'we simply don't know', we think a more useful analysis is to answer 'what have you done, what are you doing and where are you going?' Particularly in regard to the latter point, whilst we have said in the past that we have no crystal ball, it is reasonable to ask how our investment framework helps us think about the current extraordinarily difficult and uncertain environment for companies.

What have we done?

The main thing to say about the last twelve months is that we have stayed true to our investment principles which, as always, are separately shown in this report on page 9. In our minds, there is a strong temptation to start reacting to near term events unless one has the discipline of a consistent investment process. Despite the distractions of the last twelve months we are, and remain, bottom up stock pickers with a long-term investment horizon, meaning that portfolio turnover has remained low. We have said previously that performance over short-term periods will be random. Consequently, we should not draw out significant conclusions of the portfolio outperforming over this twelve-month period, particularly as we downplayed the significance of the portfolio underperforming over the first half in the interim report. Such ups and downs are to be expected with a portfolio that looks very different from the index. What we can say is that despite some significant share price falls we remain unenthused about large parts of the UK markets, such as energy and banking, as we continue to believe the long-term prospects in those areas are unexciting for growth investors.

Nevertheless, we remained alert to new opportunities and prior to the crisis bought new holdings in Farfetch (discussed in the interim report), Games Workshop and a small holding in Creo Medical. Games Workshop is a well-established retailer of its own fantasy games (such as Warhammer) and model figures that enthusiastic gamers buy and paint themselves. Over thirty years the business has built a fantastic amount of intellectual property and nurtured a loyal and passionate customer base. While this is always going to be a niche hobby, the growing interest in the fantasy area has, we think, stimulated additional demand for its products. Over the last few years, the current management team has made some well thought out tweaks to the business model that have been very successful, such as letting the company's independent wholesalers also sell the product online, simplifying the rules book to make the game more accessible to new customers, increased new product introductions and also engaged digitally with the gaming community. This latter change has generated significant goodwill and strengthened the relationship Games Workshop has with its community of gamers. We are excited about the remaining growth potential for the hobby, particularly internationally, as well as the scope to build a large and profitable IP licensing business. The latter will take time and patience, but we think the returns to long-term shareholders are potentially significant.

Creo Medical is one of the most exciting smaller companies we have come across in the recent past. It designs and manufactures new and highly innovative endoscopes which enable physicians to take this technology outside of the purely investigative/diagnostic realm into the operating theatre and use it effectively in therapeutic applications. Although Creo is still at an early stage of its development, and therefore with associated risks, there is growing evidence that its products are transformative to patient care in a range of cancers (starting with gastrointestinal indications), allowing for significantly quicker recovery, reduced hospital stays and lower recurrence rates. A recent liquidity event – the company raised some funding to accelerate the distribution/commercialisation of its product suite – allowed us to buy a small holding.

What are we doing?

Since the coronavirus outbreak, the focus of our discussions (now over Zoom calls rather than in person) has continued to be on finding and owning the most promising UK growth businesses over a five-year plus horizon. This means that we are simultaneously looking for new opportunities while also carefully appraising the resilience of our existing investments in the face of current events and asking ourselves if the long-term case has in any way been impaired. One painful decision we took in the early stages of the crisis was to sell the holding in the cruise ship operator Carnival, despite the shares having already fallen significantly. In this particular case, we had concerns that growing the cruise market may prove challenging when a semblance of normality returns while, in the short-term, the balance sheet of the business was uncomfortably laden with debt, not a promising position when revenues are rapidly drying up. Interestingly, subsequent to our sale, Carnival has attempted to shore up its balance sheet with a mixture of expensive debt and equity which will undoubtedly dilute the upside for shareholders in the business should a cheerful scenario of recovery for cruising come to pass. On the flipside,

we bought a new holding in 4imprint, a company which we have liked for some time but where valuation has been a stumbling block. 4imprint distributes promotional products used by businesses (primarily in the United States) as a form of advertising or as gifts to customers and employees. It operates in a large and extremely fragmented market and, through investments in marketing and its sales force, it has been gaining market share over many years from its smaller and less efficient competitors. The current lockdown measures have resulted in an extremely challenging operating environment. However, the business has a very robust financial position and should withstand the storm. If the 2009 downturn is an example, the company will emerge stronger and continue to significantly outgrow its underlying market.

Where are we going?

Perhaps the most important question of the three we asked ourselves is this final one. Neither of your portfolio managers are fans of trying to draw lessons from the last crisis, as some commentators have done. This smacks to us of generals trying to fight the last war. In reality, all crises are unique and complicated in their origins and we have been considering whether some of the broad themes that many of our holdings play into still ring true. What we would venture is that much of our thinking here is tentative and may change as more information comes to light. The most important theme by far is the growing digitisation of the economy and our belief that many growth businesses are trying to capitalise on this. Our view is that the current crisis is akin to a shock that will likely accelerate this trend. From our own business to others that we own or observe, necessity is forcing organisations to adopt digital ways of working. This can be painful but in the long-term can unlock significant productivity gains and opportunities for smart management teams. Our holdings in FDM Group and First Derivatives are, we believe, well-placed to benefit from enterprises in many different industries increasing investments in their technology infrastructure. The current crisis will also likely further entrench the 'digital' habits of consumers and boost demand for our consumer technology platforms and retailers such as Just Eat Takeaway.com, Farfetch and Boohoo.com. We also remain enthusiastic about the strong network effects underpinning the dominant positions of Rightmove and Autotrader. In this severe and sudden downturn in activity in their end markets, however, both businesses have rightly realised that their competitive positions are best served by being financially supportive of their own customers, estate agent and second-hand car dealers respectively. Our mindset in both these cases is to back this policy of short-term financial pain in order to safeguard long-term opportunities.

We cannot wish away the fact that it is likely that the most dramatic recession in UK history is pending and will cause damage whose effects are not clear. That explains why, despite the Board being supportive of us utilising the additional firepower of our borrowing facilities, we have so far been cautious in gearing the portfolio. One final point is worth noting. As growth investors, dividends do not hold centre stage in our approach and in our view should only

flow from the profits and cash flow generated after appropriate investment back into the business. The current dividend crisis in the UK, with an unprecedented decline in pay-outs to shareholders, is therefore of less interest to us. Indeed, in several cases, we have been supportive of decisions by companies to suspend dividends given the economic difficulties and the necessity to protect the business and position themselves for the opportunities that may arise.

While we remain optimistic about the overall quality and superior growth potential of the companies in the portfolio, we must acknowledge the greater than usual element of uncertainty. What gives us some confidence, if one is prepared to look beyond the immediate crisis, is that we have a high degree of confidence in the management teams of our business. In communication with many of them over recent weeks, our message has been simple: please try to do the right thing for the long-term interests of your business and try to do right by your other stakeholders such as staff, suppliers and customers. This is not easy, but rather like our investment style, we think by attempting to focus on the fundamentals of long-term success, the odds of a positive outcome are tilted in your favour. And to our fellow shareholders, we would like to thank you for your continued patience and support and look forward to updating you on our future progress.

Directors



Carolan Dobson was appointed a Director in 2014 and became Chairman in 2016. She is also Chairman of the Nomination Committee and Management Engagement Committee. She is chairman of Brunner Investment Trust plc and Blackrock Latin American Investment Trust plc. She was a fund manager holding a number of positions including director at Murray Johnstone Ltd and subsequently undertook several key roles at Abbey Asset Managers Ltd.



Andrew Westenberger was appointed a Director in 2017 and became Chairman of the Audit Committee in August 2017. He is Chief Financial Officer of Integro Insurance Brokers and Tysers, a leading independent specialist broker and risk management firm. He is also a non-executive director and trustee of the Chartered Institute of Securities and Investments. Previously, he was group finance director of Brewin Dolphin Holdings PLC and Evolution Group Plc and held senior finance roles at Barclays Capital and Deutsche Bank. He is a Chartered Accountant.



Scott Cochrane was appointed a Director in 2018 and became Senior Independent Director in August 2019. He is a senior partner at international law firm Herbert Smith Freehills. Until December 2019 he was the Global Head of Corporate. He was also a member of the firm's Global Executive Management Committee, responsible for leading the strategic direction of the firm across a global network of offices. He has over 25 years' experience advising boards and asset managers on a broad range of corporate matters.



Ruary Neill was appointed a Director in 2018. He is currently a director of JP Morgan Emerging Markets Investment Trust plc, chairs the Investment Committee at Great Ormond Street Children's Charity and is a member of the Advisory Board, SOAS China Institute, London University. Previously, he worked in investment banking at UBS Investment Bank prior to which he spent several years in the financial sector working in Asian Equity Markets for UBS Investment Bank and Schroder Securities.

All of the Directors are members of the following Committees: Nomination, Remuneration, and Management Engagement.

All Directors are members of the Audit Committee with the exception of Carolan Dobson, who stepped down from the Committee in December 2018.

Managers and Secretaries

The Company has appointed Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of Baillie Gifford & Co, as its Alternative Investment Fund Manager ('AIFM') and Company Secretary. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited has delegated investment management services to Baillie Gifford & Co. Baillie Gifford & Co is an investment management firm formed in 1927 out of the legal firm Baillie Gifford, WS, which had been involved in investment management since 1908.

Baillie Gifford is one of the largest investment trust managers in the UK and currently manage ten investment trusts. Baillie Gifford also manage unit trusts and Open Ended Investment Companies, together with investment portfolios on behalf of pension funds, charities and other institutional clients, both in the UK and overseas. Funds under the management or advice of Baillie Gifford total around £250 billion. Based in Edinburgh, it is one of the leading privately owned investment management firms in the UK, with 46 partners and a staff of around 1,300.

The Managers of Baillie Gifford UK Growth are Iain McCombie and Milena Mileva. Iain is a partner at Baillie Gifford and is the lead Manager of the UK Core strategy. Milena is an Investment Manager in the UK Equity Team.

Baillie Gifford & Co and Baillie Gifford & Co Limited are both authorised and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

Directors' Report

The Directors present their Report together with the audited Financial Statements of the Company for the year to 30 April 2020.

Corporate Governance

The Corporate Governance Report is set out on pages 20 to 23 and forms part of this Report.

Managers and Company Secretaries

Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of Baillie Gifford & Co, has been appointed as the Company's Alternative Investment Fund Manager ('AIFM') and Company Secretary. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited has delegated portfolio management services to Baillie Gifford & Co. Dealing activity and transaction reporting has been further sub-delegated to Baillie Gifford Overseas Limited and Baillie Gifford Asia (Hong Kong) Limited.

The Investment Management Agreement between the AIFM and the Company sets out the matters over which the Managers have authority in accordance with the policies and directions of, and subject to restrictions imposed by, the Board. The Investment Management Agreement is terminable on not less than six months' notice or on shorter notice in certain circumstances. Compensation would only be payable if termination occurred prior to the expiry of the notice period. The annual management fee is 0.5% of net assets, calculated and payable quarterly. For the financial year ended 30 April 2019, in order to offset the costs of repositioning the portfolio following its appointment as AIFM, Baillie Gifford agreed to waive its management fee for the year to the extent of £732,000 (approximately equal to six months' management fee payable to Baillie Gifford based on the Company's net asset value on 29 June 2018).

Careful consideration has been given by the Board as to the basis on which the management fee is charged. The Board considers that maintaining a relatively low ongoing charges ratio is in the best interests of the shareholders. The Board is also of the view that calculating the fee with reference to performance would be unlikely to exert a positive influence over the long-term performance.

The Board considers the Company's investment management and secretarial arrangements on an ongoing basis and a formal review is conducted by the Management Engagement Committee annually. The Committee considered, amongst others, the following topics in its review: the quality of the personnel assigned to handle the Company's affairs; the investment process and the results achieved to date; investment performance; the administrative services provided by the Secretaries and the quality of information provided; the marketing efforts undertaken by the Managers; the relationship with the Managers; and, comparative peer group charges and fees.

Following the most recent review, the Management Engagement Committee concluded that the continuing appointment of Baillie Gifford & Co Limited as AIFM and the delegation of investment management services to Baillie Gifford & Co, on the terms agreed, is in the interests of shareholders as a whole. This was subsequently approved by the Board.

Depository

In accordance with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive, The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited has been appointed as Depository to the Company. The Depository's responsibilities include cash monitoring, safe keeping of the Company's financial instruments, verifying ownership and maintaining a record of other assets and monitoring the Company's compliance with investment limits and leverage requirements. The custody function is also undertaken by The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited ('the Custodian').

All the Directors will retire at the Annual General Meeting and offer themselves for re-election. Following a formal performance evaluation, the Chairman confirms that the Board considers that their performance continues to be effective and each remains committed to the Company. Their contribution to the Board is greatly valued and the Board recommends their re-election to shareholders.

Director Indemnification and Insurance

The Company has entered into qualifying third party deeds of indemnity in favour of each of its Directors. The deeds which were in force during the year to 30 April 2020 and up to the date of approval of this report, cover any liabilities that may arise to a third party, other than the Company, for negligence, default or breach of trust or duty. The Directors are not indemnified in respect of liabilities to the Company, any regulatory or criminal fines, any costs incurred in connection with criminal proceedings in which the Director is convicted or civil proceedings brought by the Company in which judgement is given against her or him. In addition, the indemnity does not apply to any liability to the extent that it is recovered from another person.

The Company maintains Directors' and Officers' liability insurance.

Conflicts of Interest

Each Director submits a list of potential conflicts of interest to the Board for consideration and approval at each meeting. The Board considers these carefully, taking into account the circumstances surrounding them prior to authorisation. Having considered the lists of potential conflicts there were no situations which gave rise to a direct or indirect interest of a Director which conflicted with the interests of the Company.

Dividend

The Board recommends a final dividend of 3.10p per ordinary share. No interim dividend was declared (2019 – 1.50p). This makes a total of 3.10p for the year (2019 – 4.45p). Dividends are paid by way of a single final payment and will be the minimum permissible to maintain investment trust status, reflecting our priority, which is capital growth.

If approved by shareholders at the Annual General Meeting, the recommended final dividend per ordinary share will be paid on 12 August 2020 to shareholders on the register at the close of business on 10 July 2020. The ex-dividend date is 9 July 2020.

Share Capital

Capital Structure

The Company's capital structure at 30 April 2020 consists of 160,917,184 ordinary shares of 25p each (2019 – 160,917,184) of which 150,520,484 (2019 – 150,520,484) are allotted and fully paid and 10,396,700 (2019 – 10,396,700) are held in treasury. There are no restrictions concerning the holding or transfer of the Company's ordinary shares and there are no special rights attached to any of the shares.

Dividend

The ordinary shares carry a right to receive dividends. Interim dividends are determined by the Directors, whereas the proposed final dividend is subject to shareholder approval.

Capital Entitlement

On a winding up, after meeting the liabilities of the Company, the surplus assets will be paid to ordinary shareholders in proportion to their shareholdings.

Voting

Each ordinary shareholder present in person or by proxy is entitled to one vote on a show of hands and, on a poll, to one vote for every share held.

Information on the deadlines for proxy appointments can be found on pages 49 and 50.

Annual General Meeting

Share Issuance Authority

At the last Annual General Meeting, the Directors were granted shareholders' approval for a general authority to allot shares and also an authority to issue shares or sell shares held in treasury on a non pre-emptive basis (without first offering such shares to existing shareholders pro-rata to their existing holdings). No shares were issued during the year.

Both authorities expire at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and the Directors are seeking shareholders' approval to renew them for a further year, as detailed below.

Resolution 11 in the Notice of Annual General Meeting seeks a general authority for the Directors to allot shares up to an aggregate nominal amount of £3,763,012. This amount represents 10% of the Company's total ordinary share capital in issue at 18 June 2020 and meets institutional guidelines. This authority will continue until the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting to be held in 2021 or on the expiry of 15 months from the passing of the resolutions, if earlier.

Resolution 12, which is proposed as a special resolution, seeks authority for the Directors to issue shares or sell shares held in treasury on a non pre-emptive basis for cash up to an aggregate nominal amount of £3,763,012 (representing 10% of the issued ordinary share capital of the Company as at 18 June 2020). This authority will only be used to issue shares or sell shares from treasury at a premium to net asset value on the basis of debt valued at par value and only when the Directors believe that it would be in the best interests of the Company to do so. This authority will continue until the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting to be held in 2021 or on the expiry of 15 months from the passing of the resolutions, if earlier.

Market Purchases of Own Shares

At the last Annual General Meeting the Company was granted authority to purchase up to 22,563,020 ordinary shares (equivalent to 14.99% of its issued share capital), such authority to expire at the 2020 Annual General Meeting. The Directors are seeking shareholders' approval at the Annual General Meeting to renew the authority to make market purchases up to 22,563,020 ordinary shares representing approximately 14.99% of the Company's ordinary shares in issue at the date of passing of the resolution, such authority to expire at the Annual General Meeting of the Company to be held in 2021.

No shares (2019 – no shares) were bought back during the year under review and 10,396,700 (2019 – 10,396,700) shares are held in treasury.

The share buy-back policy seeks to operate in the best interests of shareholders by taking into account the relative level of the Company's share price discount when compared with peer group trusts, the absolute level of discount and the impact from share buy-back activity on the long-term liquidity of the Company's issued shares.

The Company may hold bought-back shares ‘in treasury’ and then:

- (i) sell such shares (or any of them) for cash (or its equivalent under the Companies Act 2006); or
- (ii) cancel the shares (or any of them).

All buy-backs will initially be held in treasury. Shares will only be resold from treasury at a premium to net asset value per ordinary share.

The Company shall not be entitled to exercise the voting rights attaching to treasury shares.

In accordance with the Listing Rules of the UK Listing Authority, the maximum price (excluding expenses) that may be paid on the exercise of the authority must not exceed the higher of:

- (i) 5 per cent. above the average closing price on the London Stock Exchange of an ordinary share over the five business days immediately preceding the date of purchase; and
- (ii) the higher of the price of the last independent trade and the highest current independent bid on the London Stock Exchange as stipulated by Article 5(1) of Commission Regulation (EC) 22 December 2003 implementing the Market Abuse Directive as regards exemptions for buy back programmes and stabilisation of financial instruments (No. 2273/2003).

The minimum price (exclusive of expenses) that may be paid will be 25p per share. Purchases of shares will be made within guidelines established, from time to time, by the Board. Your attention is drawn to Resolution 13 in the Notice of Annual General Meeting. This authority, if conferred, will only be exercised if to do so would result in an increase in net asset value per ordinary share for the remaining shareholders and if it is considered in the best interests of shareholders generally.

Financial Instruments

The Company’s financial instruments comprise its investment portfolio, cash balances and debtors and creditors that arise directly from its operations such as sales and purchases awaiting settlement and accrued income. The financial risk management objectives and policies arising from its financial instruments and the exposure of the Company to risk are disclosed in note 18 to the Financial Statements.

Articles of Association

The Company’s Articles of Association may only be amended by special resolution at a general meeting of shareholders.

Disclosure of Information to Auditors

The Directors confirm that, so far as each of the Directors is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the Company’s Auditors are unaware and the Directors have taken all the steps that they might reasonably be expected to have taken as Directors in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Company’s Auditors are aware of that information.

Independent Auditors

Following the conclusion of a formal tender process led by the Company’s Audit Committee, the Board has approved the proposed appointment of Ernst & Young LLP as Auditor for the financial year commencing 1 May 2020. Ernst & Young LLP has expressed its willingness to be appointed Auditor to the Company. The appointment is subject to shareholder approval at the Annual General Meeting scheduled to be held on 5 August 2020 and resolutions concerning Ernst & Young LLP’s appointment and remuneration will be submitted to the Annual General Meeting. The Board extends its appreciation to PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP for its services as Auditors and confirms that there are no matters in connection with PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP ceasing to hold office as Auditors following the 2020 audit which need to be brought to the attention of shareholders.

Post Balance Sheet Events

The Directors confirm that there have been no significant post Balance Sheet events up to 19 June 2020 that require disclosure in the Financial Statements.

Stakeholder Engagement

Although the Company has no employees, trade suppliers or customers, the Directors give regular consideration to the need to foster the Company’s business relationships with its stakeholders, in particular with shareholders, its externally appointed Managers, other professional service providers and lenders. The effect of this consideration upon the key decisions taken by the Company during the financial year is set out in further detail in the Strategic Report on page 8.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Streamlined Energy & Carbon Reporting (‘SECR’)

All of the Company’s activities are outsourced to third parties. The Company therefore has no greenhouse gas emissions to report from its operations, nor does it have responsibility for any other emissions producing sources under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors’ Reports) Regulations 2013. For the same reasons as set out above, the Company considers itself to be a low energy user under the SECR regulations and therefore is not required to disclose energy and carbon information.

Bribery Act

The Company has a zero tolerance policy towards bribery and is committed to carrying out business fairly, honestly and openly. The Managers also adopt a zero tolerance approach and have policies and procedures in place to prevent bribery.

Criminal Finances Act 2017

The Company has a commitment to zero tolerance towards the criminal facilitation of tax evasion.

Recommendation

The Directors unanimously recommend you vote in favour of the resolutions to be proposed at the Annual General Meeting as it is their view that the resolutions are in the best interests of shareholders as a whole.

Corporate Governance Report

The Board is committed to achieving and demonstrating high standards of Corporate Governance. This statement outlines how the principles of the 2018 UK Corporate Governance Code (the 'Code') which can be found at www.frc.org.uk and the relevant principles of the Association of Investment Companies Code of Corporate Governance (the 'AIC Code') were applied throughout the financial year. The AIC Code provides a framework of best practice for investment companies and can be found at www.theaic.co.uk.

Compliance

The Board confirms that the Company has complied throughout the year under review with the relevant provisions of the Code and the recommendation of the AIC Code. The Code includes provisions relating to the role of the chief executive, executive directors' remuneration and the need for an internal audit function. Given that the Company is an externally managed investment trust, the Board considers these provisions are not relevant to the Company. The need for an internal audit function specific to the Company has been addressed on page 24.

The FRC has confirmed that AIC member companies who report against the AIC Code will be meeting their obligations in relation to the UK Code (the AIC Code can be found at www.theaic.co.uk).

The Board

The Board has overall responsibility for the Company's affairs. It has a number of matters formally reserved for its approval including strategy, investment policy, gearing, share buy-back and issuance policy, treasury matters, dividend and corporate governance policy. A separate meeting devoted to strategy is held each year. The Board seeks to contribute to the delivery of the Company's strategy by engaging with the Managers in a collaborative and collegiate manner with open and respectful discussion and debate being encouraged, whilst also ensuring that appropriate and regular challenge is brought and evaluation is conducted. The Board also reviews the Financial Statements, investment transactions, revenue budgets and performance of the Company. Full and timely information is provided to the Board to enable it to function effectively and to allow Directors to discharge their responsibilities.

The Board comprises four Directors, all of whom are non-executive. The Chairman is responsible for organising the business of the Board, ensuring its effectiveness and setting its agenda. The executive responsibility for investment management has been delegated to the Company's Alternative Investment Fund Manager ('AIFM'), Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, and, in the context of a Board comprising only non-executive Directors, there is no chief executive officer. The Senior Independent Director is Scott Cochrane.

The Directors believe that the Board has a balance of skills and experience that enables it to provide effective strategic leadership and proper governance of the Company. Information about the Directors, including their relevant experience, can be found on page 15.

There is an agreed procedure for Directors to seek independent professional advice, if necessary, at the Company's expense.

Appointments to the Board

The terms and conditions of Directors' appointments are set out in formal letters of appointment which are available for inspection on request.

Under the provisions of the Company's Articles of Association, a Director appointed during the year is required to retire and seek election by shareholders at the next Annual General Meeting. The Board has agreed that all Directors will retire at each Annual General Meeting and, if appropriate, offer themselves for re-election.

Independence of Directors

All the Directors are considered by the Board to be independent of the Managers and free of any business or other relationship which could interfere with the exercise of their independent judgement.

The Directors recognise the importance of succession planning for company boards and review the Board composition annually. The Board is of the view that length of service will not necessarily compromise the independence or contribution of Directors of an investment trust company, where continuity and experience can be a benefit to the Board. The Board concurs with the view expressed in the AIC Code that long serving Directors should not be prevented from being considered independent.

Meetings

There is an annual cycle of Board meetings which is designed to address, in a systematic way, overall strategy, review of investment policy, investment performance, marketing, revenue budgets, dividend policy and communication with shareholders. The Board considers that it meets sufficiently regularly to discharge its duties effectively. The table below shows the attendance record for the Board and Committee meetings held during the year. The Annual General Meeting was attended by all Directors serving at that date.

Nomination Committee

The Nomination Committee consists of all the Directors and Carolan Dobson is the Chairman of the Committee. The Committee meets on an annual basis and at such other times as may be required. The Committee has written terms of reference which include reviewing the composition of the Board, identifying and nominating new candidates for appointment to the Board, Board appraisal, succession planning and training. The Committee also considers whether Directors should be recommended for re-election by shareholders.

The Committee's Terms of Reference are available on request from the Company and on the Company's page of the Managers' website: www.bgukgrowthfund.com.

Policy on Chairman's Tenure

The Board's policy is that the Chairman will serve for no longer than nine years, other than in exceptional circumstances for the benefit of the Company.

Performance Evaluation

An appraisal of the Chairman, each Director and a performance evaluation and review of the Board as a whole and its Committees was carried out during the year. Each Director and the Chairman responded to an evaluation questionnaire. The Chairman's appraisal was led by Scott Cochrane, the Senior Independent Director. The appraisals and evaluations considered, amongst other criteria, the balance of skills of the Board, training and development requirements, the contribution of individual Directors and the overall effectiveness of the Board and its Committees. Following this process it was concluded that there was a diverse range of skills within the Board, and the performance of each Director, the Chairman, the Board and its Committees continues to be effective and that each Director and the Chairman remain committed to the Company.

Diversity

Appointments to the Board are made on merit with due regard for the benefits of diversity including gender. The priority in appointing new Directors is to identify the candidate with the best range of skills and experience to complement existing Directors.

The Board believes that maintaining a diversity of thought and experience on the Board and at an operational level within Baillie Gifford represents the best way of discharging its responsibilities to shareholders.

In furtherance of this belief, the Board will look for the best ways to increase the diversity of gender, ideas, professional experiences and cultural backgrounds to which the Company is exposed.

The Board will continue to monitor diversity on an ongoing basis, having regard to developments in Corporate Governance Code and wider market practice, and seek to ensure that the Company retains the benefits of a diversity of thought and experience going forward. As circumstances allow, the Company will continue to look for opportunities to broaden the diversity to which the Company is exposed, in furtherance of this commitment.

A review of the Chairman's and the other Directors' commitments was carried out and the Nomination Committee is satisfied that they are capable of devoting sufficient time to the Company. There were no significant changes to the Chairman's other commitments during the year.

Induction and Training

New Directors are provided with an induction programme which is tailored to the particular circumstances of the appointee. Regular briefings were provided during the year on industry and regulatory matters. Directors receive other relevant training as necessary.

Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee consists of all Directors and Scott Cochrane is the Chairman of the Committee. The Remuneration Committee reviews and makes recommendations to the Board in respect of the level of remuneration paid to Directors within the limits approved by shareholders. The Company's policy on remuneration is set out in the Directors' Remuneration Report on pages 26 and 27.

The Committee's Terms of Reference are available on request from the Company and on the Company's page of the Managers' website: www.bgukgrowthfund.com.

Management Engagement Committee

The role of the Management Engagement Committee is to ensure that the Manager remains suitable to manage the portfolio, that the management contract is competitive and reasonable for the shareholders, and that the Company maintains appropriate administrative and company secretarial support. All Directors are members of the Management Engagement Committee which is chaired by the Chairman of the Board. The Board considers each member of the Committee to be independent.

To discharge its duties, the Committee met on one occasion during the year to consider: the performance and suitability of the Manager; the terms and conditions of the AIFM Agreement, including fees; and, the Committee's Terms of Reference.

The Committee's Terms of Reference are available on request from the Company and on the Company's page of the Managers' website: www.bgukgrowthfund.com.

Audit Committee

The report of the Audit Committee is set out on pages 24 and 25.

Internal Controls and Risk Management

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for the Company's risk management and internal control systems and for reviewing their effectiveness. The systems are designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives and can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Board confirms that there is an ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the significant risks faced by the Company in accordance with the FRC guidance 'Guidance on Risk Management, Internal Control and Related Financial and Business Reporting'.

The practical measures in relation to the design, implementation and maintenance of control policies and procedures to safeguard the Company's assets and to manage its affairs properly, including the maintenance of effective operational and compliance controls have been delegated to the Managers and Secretaries.

The Board oversees the functions delegated to the Managers and Secretaries and the controls managed by the AIFM in accordance with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive (as detailed below). Baillie Gifford & Co's Internal Audit and Compliance Departments and the AIFM's permanent risk function provide the Audit Committee with regular reports on their monitoring programmes. The reporting procedures for these departments are defined and formalised within a service level agreement. Baillie Gifford & Co conducts an annual review of its system of internal controls which is documented within an internal controls report which complies with ISAE 3402 and Technical Release AAF 01/06 – Assurance Reports on Internal Controls of Service Organisations made available to Third Parties. This report is independently reviewed by Baillie Gifford & Co's Auditor and a copy is submitted to the Audit Committee.

A report identifying the material risks faced by the Company and the key controls employed to manage these risks is reviewed by the Audit Committee. These procedures ensure that consideration is given regularly to the nature and extent of risks facing the Company and that they are being actively monitored. Where changes in risk have been identified during the year they also provide a mechanism to assess whether further action is required to manage these risks.

The Directors confirm that they have reviewed the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal controls systems, which accord with the FRC 'Guidance on Risk Management, Internal Control and Related Financial and Business Reporting' and they have procedures in place to review their effectiveness on a regular basis. No significant weaknesses were identified in the year under review and up to the date of this Report.

The Board confirms that these procedures have been in place throughout the Company's financial year and continue to be in place up to the date of approval of this Report.

To comply with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive, The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited acts as the Company's Depository and Baillie Gifford & Co Limited as its AIFM.

The Depository's responsibilities include cash monitoring, safe keeping of the Company's financial instruments, verifying ownership and maintaining a record of other assets and monitoring the Company's compliance with investment limits and leverage requirements. The Depository is liable for the loss of financial instruments held in custody. The Depository will ensure that any delegate segregates the assets of the Company. The Company's Depository also acts as the Company's Custodian. The Custodian prepares reports on its key controls and safeguards which are independently reviewed by KPMG LLP. The reports are reviewed by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department and a summary of the key points is reported to the Audit Committee and any concerns are investigated.

The Depository provides the Audit Committee with a report on its monitoring activities.

The AIFM has established a permanent risk management function to ensure that effective risk management policies and procedures are in place and to monitor compliance with risk limits. The AIFM has a risk management policy which covers the risks associated with the management of the portfolio, and the adequacy and effectiveness of this policy is reviewed and approved at least annually. This review includes the risk management processes and systems and limits for each risk area.

The risk limits, which are set by the AIFM and approved by the Board, take into account the objectives, strategy and risk profile of the portfolio. These limits, including leverage (see page 54), are monitored and the sensitivity of the portfolio to key risks is undertaken periodically as appropriate to ascertain the impact of changes in key variables in the portfolio. Exceptions from limits monitoring and stress testing undertaken by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department are escalated to the AIFM and reported to the Board along with any remedial measures being taken.

Going Concern

In accordance with The Financial Reporting Council's guidance on going concern and liquidity risk, including its Covid-19 guidance, the Directors have undertaken a rigorous review of the Company's ability to continue as a going concern and specifically in the context of the coronavirus pandemic.

The Company's principal risks are market related and include market risk, liquidity risk and credit risk. An explanation of these risks and how they are managed is contained in note 18 to the Financial Statements. The Board has, in particular, considered the impact of heightened market volatility since the coronavirus outbreak but does not believe the Company's going concern status is affected. The Company's assets, the majority of which are investments in quoted securities which are readily realisable, exceed its liabilities significantly. All borrowing facilities require the prior approval of the Board. Gearing levels and compliance with borrowing covenants are reviewed by the Board on a regular basis. The Company has continued to comply with the investment trust status requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) Regulations 2011.

In accordance with the Company's Articles of Association, shareholders have the right to vote on the continuation of the Company every five years, the next vote being at the Annual General Meeting to be held in 2024. Accordingly, the Financial Statements have been prepared on the going concern basis as it is the Directors' opinion, having assessed the principal risks and other matters set out in the Viability Statement on page 7, that the Company will continue in operational existence for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these Financial Statements.

Relations with Shareholders

The Board places great importance on communication with shareholders. The Company's Managers meet regularly with shareholders and their representatives. The Chairman also meets shareholders independently of the Managers and reports shareholders' views to the Board. Shareholders wishing to communicate with any members of the Board may do so by writing to them at the Company's registered office or through the Company's broker, Winterflood Investment Trusts (see contact details on back cover). All correspondence addressed to the Chairman is dealt with directly by the Chairman.

The Company's Annual General Meeting provides a further forum for communication with all shareholders. The level of proxies lodged for each resolution is announced at the Meeting and is published at www.bgukgrowthfund.com subsequent to the meeting. The notice period for the Annual General Meeting is at least twenty working days. Shareholders and potential investors may obtain up-to-date information on the Company from the Managers' website at www.bgukgrowthfund.com.

Corporate Governance and Stewardship

The Company believes that it is in the shareholders' interests to consider environmental, social and governance ('ESG') factors when selecting and retaining investments and has asked the Managers to take these issues into account.

The Managers do not exclude companies from their investment universe purely on the grounds of ESG factors but adopt a positive engagement approach whereby matters are discussed with management with the aim of improving the relevant policies and management systems and enabling the Managers to consider how ESG factors could impact long-term investment returns. The Managers' Statement of Compliance with the UK Stewardship Code can be found on the Managers' website: www.bailliegifford.com.

The Company has given discretionary voting powers to Baillie Gifford & Co. The Managers vote against resolutions they consider may damage shareholders' rights or economic interests and their actions are reported on at Board meetings.

The Managers are signatories to the United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment and the Carbon Disclosure Project and are also members of the International Corporate Governance Network.

Audit Committee Report

The Audit Committee consists of all independent Directors except for the Chairman of the Board, Carolan Dobson, who stepped down from the Audit Committee in December 2018 in line with the recommendation of the UK Corporate Governance Code published in July 2018. The members of the Committee consider that they have the requisite financial skills and experience to fulfil the responsibilities of the Committee. Andrew Westenberger, Chairman of the Committee, is a Chartered Accountant. The Committee's authority and duties are clearly defined within its written Terms of Reference which are available on request from the Company and on the Company's page of the Managers' website: www.bgukgrowthfund.com. The Terms of Reference are reviewed annually.

The Committee's effectiveness is reviewed on an annual basis as part of the Board's performance evaluation process (see page 21).

At least once a year the Committee meets with the external Auditors without any representative of the Manager being present.

Main Activities of the Committee

The Committee met twice during the year to 30 April 2020 and PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, the external Auditors, attended both meetings. Baillie Gifford & Co's Internal Audit and Compliance Departments and the AIFM's permanent risk function provided reports on their monitoring programmes.

The matters considered, monitored and reviewed by the Committee during the course of the year included the following:

- the Annual and Interim reports;
- the Company's accounting policies and practices;
- the regulatory changes impacting the Company;
- the fairness, balance and understandability of the Annual Report and Financial Statements and whether it provided the information necessary for shareholders to assess the Company's performance, business model and strategy;
- the effectiveness of the Company's internal control environment;
- the appointment/reappointment, remuneration and terms of engagement of the external Auditors;
- whether the audit services contract should be put out to tender;
- the policy on the engagement of the external Auditors to supply non-audit services;
- the independence and objectivity of the external Auditors and the effectiveness of the audit process;
- the need for the Company to have its own internal audit function;
- internal controls reports received from the Managers and other service providers; and
- the arrangements in place within Baillie Gifford & Co whereby its staff may, in confidence, raise concerns about possible improprieties in matters of financial reporting or other matters.

Internal Audit

The Committee continues to believe that the compliance and internal control systems and the internal audit function in place within the Investment Managers provide sufficient assurance that a sound system of internal control, which safeguards shareholders' investment and the Company's assets, is maintained. An internal audit function, specific to the Company, is therefore considered unnecessary.

Financial Reporting

The Committee considers that the most significant issues likely to affect the Financial Statements are the existence and valuation of investments, as they represent 98.5% of total assets, and the accuracy and completeness of income from investments.

All of the investments are in quoted securities and market prices are readily available from independent external pricing sources. The Committee reviewed the Managers' Report on Internal Controls which details the controls in place regarding recording and pricing of investments, accurate recording of investment income and the reconciliation of investment holdings to third party data.

The value of all the investments at 30 April 2020 were agreed to external price sources and the portfolio holdings agreed to confirmations from the Company's Custodian.

The Managers and Auditors confirmed to the Committee that they were not aware of any material misstatements in the context of the Financial Statements as a whole and that the Financial Statements are in accordance with applicable law and accounting standards.

Audit Tender

During the year the Company tendered its external audit. Invitations to tender were issued to three audit firms, resulting in comprehensive proposals of a very high standard being submitted by two firms, who were both invited to present their approach in more detail to the Audit Committee. In evaluating the firms, the primary focus was on audit quality giving specific consideration to audit approach and delivery with attention on the audit engagement team quality; insight into future developments likely to affect the Company; and independence. Following a robust and transparent review process, where the audit firms were subjected to scrutiny and appropriate challenge, the Board unanimously decided to propose Ernst & Young LLP for appointment as Auditor and a resolution to this effect will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting.

In recognition of underlying audit rotation requirements, the Committee currently intends that a further tender process should be undertaken not later than 30 April 2030 to cover the financial years ending 30 April 2031 onwards.

Internal Controls and Risk Management

The Committee reviewed the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal controls systems as described on pages 21 and 22. No significant weaknesses were identified in the year under review.

External Auditors

To fulfil its responsibility regarding the independence and objectivity of the external Auditors, the Committee reviewed:

- the audit plan for the current year;
- a report from the Auditors describing their arrangements to manage auditor independence and received confirmation of its independence; and
- the extent of non-audit services provided by the external Auditors. There were no non-audit fees for the year to 30 April 2020.

To assess the effectiveness of the external Auditors, the Committee reviewed and considered:

- the Auditors' fulfilment of the agreed audit plan;
- feedback from the Secretaries on the performance of the audit team;
- the Audit Quality Inspection Report from the FRC; and
- detailed discussion with audit personnel to challenge audit processes and deliverables.

To fulfil its responsibility for oversight of the external audit process the Committee considered and reviewed:

- the Auditors' engagement letter;
- the Auditors' proposed audit strategy;
- the audit fee; and
- a report from the Auditors on the conclusion of the audit.

PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, or its predecessor firms, have been engaged as the Company's Auditors for 26 years. The audit partners responsible for the audit are rotated at least every five years in accordance with professional and regulatory standards in order to protect independence and objectivity and to provide fresh challenge to the business.

PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP has confirmed that it believes it is independent within the meaning of regulatory and professional requirements and that the objectivity of the audit partner and staff is not impaired.

Having carried out the review process described above, the Committee is satisfied that the Auditors have remained independent and effective.

During its tenure as Auditors, PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP has provided a quality service and has demonstrated a high level of professionalism. The statement of reasons in connection with PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP ceasing to hold office as Auditors is on page 57.

There are no contractual obligations restricting the Committee's choice of external Auditors.

Directors' Remuneration Report

This report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Statement by the Chairman

The Directors' Remuneration Policy is subject to shareholder approval every three years or sooner if an alteration to the policy is proposed. The Remuneration Policy which is set out below was approved at the Annual General Meeting in August 2017 and so an ordinary resolution for the approval of the Remuneration Policy will be put to the members at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting currently scheduled to be held on 5 August 2020. No changes are proposed to the Policy.

The Remuneration Committee reviewed the level of fees during the year and the Board agreed the Committee's recommendation that, with effect from 1 May 2020, Directors' fees should be increased by 0.8%, being the increase in the Consumer Price Index during the year to 30 April 2020. The fees were last increased on 1 May 2019.

Directors' Remuneration Policy

The determination of the Directors' fees is a matter considered by the Remuneration Committee and recommended to the Board for adoption.

It is the Board's policy to determine the level of Directors' remuneration having regard to amounts payable to non-executive Directors in the industry generally, the role that individual directors fulfil in respect of Board and Committee responsibilities, and time committed to the Company's affairs, taking into account the aggregate limit of fees set out in the Company's Articles of Association. This aggregate limit of Directors' fees is currently set at £200,000 per annum and any increase in this level requires approval by the Board and the Company's shareholders. The Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Audit Committee and the Senior Independent Director each receive fees at a higher rate than the other Directors to reflect their additional responsibilities. Directors' fees are set at a level to recruit and retain individuals of sufficient calibre, with the level of knowledge, experience and expertise necessary to promote the success of the Company in reaching its short and long-term strategic objectives.

The Board and its Committees exclusively comprise non-executive Directors. No Director past or present has an entitlement to a Company pension, and the Company has not, and does not intend to operate a share scheme for Directors or to award any share options or long-term performance incentives to any Director. No Director has a service contract with the Company. However, Directors have a letter of appointment. Directors do not receive exit payments and are not provided with any compensation for loss of office. No other payments are made to Directors other than the reimbursement of reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred in attending to the Company's business.

The terms of Directors' letters of appointment are available for inspection at the Company's registered office address during normal business hours and during the Annual General Meeting at the location of such meeting.

The Board did not seek the views of shareholders in setting this Remuneration Policy. Any comments on the Policy received from shareholders would be considered on a case-by-case basis.

As the Company does not have any employees, no employee pay and employment conditions were taken into account when setting this Remuneration Policy and no employees were consulted in its construction.

Directors' fees are reviewed annually and take into account research from third parties on the fee levels of directors of peer group companies, as well as industry norms and factors affecting the time commitment expected of the Directors. New Directors are subject to the provisions set out in this Remuneration Policy.

Limits on Directors' Remuneration

The fees for the non-executive Directors are payable quarterly in arrears and the fees paid in respect of the year ended 30 April 2020 together with the expected fees payable in respect of the year ending 30 April 2021 are set out in the table below. The fees payable to the Directors in the subsequent financial years will be determined following an annual review of the Directors' fees.

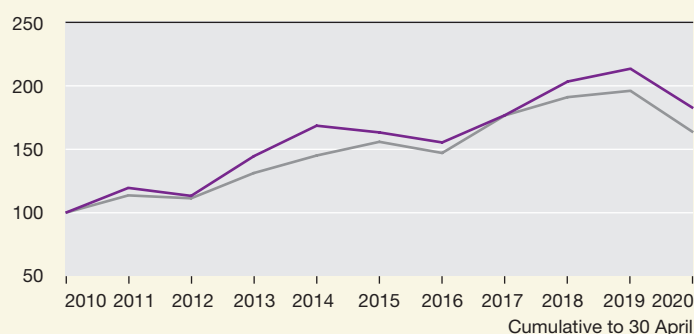

Opinion

In our opinion, Baillie Gifford UK Growth Fund plc's financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs as at 30 April 2020 and of its net return and cash flows for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards, comprising FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', and applicable law); and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

We have audited the financial statements, included within the Annual Report and Financial Statements (the 'Annual Report'), which comprise: the Balance Sheet as at 30 April 2020; the Income Statement, the Cash Flow Statement, the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year then ended; and the notes to the financial statements, which include a description of the significant accounting policies.

Our opinion is consistent with our reporting to the Audit Committee.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) ('ISAs (UK)') and applicable law. Our responsibilities under ISAs (UK) are further described in the Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Independence

We remained independent of the company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, which includes the FRC's Ethical Standard, as applicable to listed public interest entities, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

To the best of our knowledge and belief, we declare that non-audit services prohibited by the FRC's Ethical Standard were not provided to the company.

Our Audit Approach

Overview



- Overall materiality: £2.6 million (2019: £3.0 million), based on 1% of net assets.
- The Company is a standalone Investment Trust Company and engages Baillie Gifford & Co Limited (the 'AIFM') to manage its assets.
- We conducted our audit of the financial statements using information from the AIFM to whom the Directors have delegated the provision of all administrative functions.
- We tailored the scope of our audit taking into account the types of investments within the Company, the involvement of the third parties referred to above, the accounting processes and controls, and the industry in which the Company operates.
- We obtained an understanding of the control environment in place at the AIFM and adopted a fully substantive testing approach using reports obtained from the AIFM.
- Income from investments.
- Valuation and existence of listed investments.
- Consideration of impacts of COVID-19.

The scope of our audit

As part of designing our audit, we determined materiality and assessed the risks of material misstatement in the financial statements. In particular, we looked at where the directors made subjective judgements, for example in respect of significant accounting estimates that involved making assumptions and considering future events that are inherently uncertain.

Capability of the audit in detecting irregularities, including fraud

Based on our understanding of the company and industry, we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to breaches of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 (see page 7 of the Annual Report), and we considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material effect on the financial statements. We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements such as the Companies Act 2006. We evaluated

management's incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the risk of override of controls), and determined that the principal risks were related to posting inappropriate journal entries to increase revenue (investment income and capital gains) or to increase net asset value, and management bias in accounting estimates. Audit procedures performed by the engagement team included:

- Discussions with the manager and the Audit Committee, including consideration of known or suspected instances of non-compliance with laws and regulation and fraud;
- Reviewing relevant meeting minutes, including those of the Audit Committee;
- Assessment of the Company's compliance with the requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010, including recalculation of numerical aspects of the eligibility conditions;
- Identifying and testing journal entries posted throughout the year and in particular manual year end journal entries posted during the preparation of the financial statements. This included but was not limited to testing journals with unusual account combinations, misappropriate users or reviewers and journals posted at unusual times; and
- Designing audit procedures to incorporate unpredictability around the nature, timing or extent of our testing.

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above and the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it. Also, the risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusion.

Key audit matter
Valuation and existence of listed investments

Refer to page 24 (Audit Committee Report), page 39 (Principal Accounting Policies) and page 42 (Notes to the Financial Statements). The investment portfolio at 30 April 2020 comprised listed equity investments of £259.79 million. We focused on the valuation and existence of investments because investments represent the principal element of the net asset value as disclosed in the Balance Sheet in the financial statements.

Consideration of Impacts of COVID-19

Refer to the Chairman's Statement (page 2), Principal Risks (page 6), the Viability Statement (page 7) and the Going Concern Statement (page 22), which disclose the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

From a small number of cases of an unknown virus in 2019, the COVID-19 viral infection has become a global pandemic. It has caused disruption to supply chains and travel, slowed global growth and caused volatility in global markets and in exchange rates during the first quarter of 2020 and to date.

The coronavirus impacted global capital markets significantly in March 2020. The Company's net assets were £263.66 million at 30 April 2020.

The Directors have prepared the financial statements of the Company on a going concern basis, and believe this assumption remains appropriate. This conclusion is based on the assessment that, notwithstanding the significant market uncertainties, they are satisfied that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and that the Company and its key third party service providers have in place appropriate business continuity plans and will be able to maintain service levels through the coronavirus pandemic.

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

We tested the valuation of all the listed investments by agreeing the prices used in the valuation to independent third party sources.

We tested the existence of all listed investments by agreeing the holdings of all investments to an independent confirmation from the Depository, The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited as at 30 April 2020.

No material misstatements were identified from this testing.

We evaluated the Directors' assessment of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Company by:

- Evaluating the Company's updated risk assessment and considering whether it addresses the relevant threats presented by COVID-19.
- Evaluating management's assessment of operational impacts, considering their consistency with other available information and our understanding of the business and assessing the potential impact on the financial statements.

We obtained and evaluated the Directors' going concern assessment which reflects conditions up to the point of approval of the Annual Report.

- We obtained evidence to support the key assumptions and forecasts driving the Directors' assessment. This included reviewing the Directors' assessment of the Company's financial position and forecasts, their assessment of liquidity and loan covenant compliance as well as their review of the operational resilience of the Company and oversight of key third party service providers.

We assessed the disclosures presented in the Annual Report in relation to COVID-19 by:

- Reading the other information, including the Principal Risks and Viability Statement set out in the Strategic Report, and assessing its consistency with the financial statements and the evidence we obtained in our audit.

Our conclusions relating to other information are set out in the 'Reporting on other information' section of our report.

Our conclusions relating to going concern are set out in the 'Conclusions relating to going concern' section below.

How we tailored the audit scope

We tailored the scope of our audit to ensure that we performed enough work to be able to give an opinion on the financial statements as a whole, taking into account the structure of the company, the accounting processes and controls, and the industry in which it operates.

As part of designing our audit, we determined materiality and assessed the risks of material misstatement in the financial statements. In particular, we looked at where the Directors made subjective judgements, for example in respect of significant accounting estimates that involved making assumptions and considering future events that are inherently uncertain.

Materiality

The scope of our audit was influenced by our application of materiality. We set certain quantitative thresholds for materiality. Notes to the Financial Statements

1 Principal Accounting Policies

The Financial Statements for the year to 30 April 2020 have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' on the basis of the accounting policies set out below which are consistent with those applied for the year ended 30 April 2019.

(a) Basis of Accounting

All of the Company's operations are of a continuing nature and the Financial Statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of fixed asset investments and on the assumption that approval as an investment trust under section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011 will be retained.

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, applicable UK Accounting Standards and with the AIC's Statement of Recommended Practice 'Financial Statements of Investment Trust Companies and Venture Capital Trusts' issued in November 2014 and updated in October 2019 with consequential amendments. In order to better reflect the activities of the Company and in accordance with guidance issued by the AIC, supplementary information which analyses the Income Statement between items of a revenue and capital nature has been presented.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Company's Balance Sheet when it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

The Directors consider the Company's functional currency to be sterling as the Company's shareholders are predominantly based in the UK and the Company and its investment manager, who are subject to the UK's regulatory environment, are also UK based.

(b) Investments

The Company's investments are classified as held at fair value through profit and loss in accordance with sections 11 and 12 of FRS 102. They are managed and evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with the Company's investment strategy and information about the investments are provided to the Board on that basis.

Purchases and sales of investments are recognised on a trade date basis.

Upon initial recognition investment in securities are held at fair value through profit or loss. Subsequently, investments are included at fair value which are quoted bid prices for investments traded in active markets. Changes in the fair value of investments and gains and losses on disposal are recognised as capital items in the Income Statement.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits repayable on demand. Deposits are repayable on demand if they can be withdrawn at any time without notice and without penalty or if they have a maturity or period of notice of not more than one working day.

(d) Income

- (i) Income from equity investments is brought into account on the date on which the investments are quoted ex-dividend or, where no ex-dividend date is quoted, when the Company's right to receive payment is established.
- (ii) Special dividends are treated as repayments of capital or income depending on the facts of each particular case.

- (iii) Interest receivable/payable on bank deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.
- (iv) If scrip is taken in lieu of dividends in cash, the net amount of the cash dividend declared is credited to the revenue account. Any excess in the value of the shares received over the amount of the cash dividend foregone is recognised as capital.

(e) Expenses

All expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenses are charged through the revenue account except as follows:

- (i) Where they relate directly to the acquisition or disposal of an investment, in which case they are added to the cost of the investment or deducted from the sale proceeds. These expenses are commonly referred to as transaction costs and comprise brokerage commission and stamp duty.
- (ii) The management fee is allocated 30% to revenue and 70% to capital in line with the Board's expected long-term split of revenue and capital return from the Company's investment portfolio.

(f) Borrowings and Finance Costs

Finance costs are accounted for on an accruals basis. Finance costs are allocated 30% to revenue and 70% to capital in line with the Board's expected long-term split of revenue and capital return from the Company's investment portfolio.

(g) Deferred Taxation

In accordance with FRS 102, deferred taxation is provided on all timing differences which have originated but not reversed by the Balance Sheet date, calculated on a non-discounted basis at the tax rates expected to apply when the timing differences reverse, based on what has been enacted or substantially enacted, relevant to the benefit or liability. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is more likely than not that there will be taxable profits from which underlying timing differences can be deducted.

(h) Value Added Tax (VAT)

Expenses are disclosed inclusive of the related irrecoverable VAT.

(i) Dividend Distributions

Interim dividends are recognised in the year in which they are paid and final dividends are recognised in the year in which the dividends are approved by the Company's shareholders.

(j) Reserves

Gains and losses on disposal of investments, changes in the fair value of investments held, exchange differences of a capital nature and the amount by which other assets and liabilities valued at fair value differ from their book cost are dealt with in the capital reserve. Purchases of the Company's own shares are also funded from this reserve. The nominal value of such shares is transferred from share capital to the capital redemption reserve.

(k) Significant Estimates and Judgements

The Directors do not believe that any accounting judgements or estimates have been applied to these Financial Statements that have a significant risk of causing material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

The Company invests in equities for the long-term so as to achieve its investment objective of long-term capital growth with the aim of providing a total return in excess of the FTSE All-Share Index. The Company borrows money when the Board and Managers have sufficient conviction that the assets funded by borrowed monies will generate a return in excess of the cost of borrowing. In pursuing its investment objective, the Company is exposed to various types of risk that are associated with the financial instruments and markets in which it invests and could result in either a reduction in the Company's net assets or a reduction in the profits available for dividend.

These risks are categorised here as market risk (comprising interest rate risk and other price risk), liquidity risk and credit risk. The Board monitors closely the Company's exposures to these risks but does so in order to reduce the likelihood of a permanent loss of capital rather than to minimise the short-term volatility.

The risk management policies and procedures outlined in this note have not changed substantially from the previous accounting year.

Market Risk

The fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument or other investment held by the Company may fluctuate because of changes in market prices. This market risk comprises two elements – interest rate risk and market price risk. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing these risks and the Company's Investment Manager assesses the exposure to market risk when making individual investment decisions as well as monitoring the overall level of market risk across the investment portfolio on an ongoing basis. Details of the Company's investment portfolio are shown on pages 12 and 13.

(i) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate movements may affect the level of income receivable on cash deposits and interest payable on variable rate borrowings. They may also impact upon the market value of the Company's investments as the effect of interest rate movements upon the earnings of a company may have a significant impact upon the valuation of that company's equity.

The possible effects on cash flows that could arise as a result of changes in interest rates are taken into account when making investment decisions and when entering borrowing agreements.

The Board reviews on a regular basis the amount of investments in cash and the income receivable on cash deposits.

The Company has the ability to finance part of its activities through borrowings at approved levels. The amount of such borrowings and the approved levels are monitored and reviewed regularly by the Board.

The interest rate risk profile of the Company's interest bearing financial assets and liabilities at 30 April 2020 was nil.

Financial Assets

Cash deposits generally comprise overnight call or short-term money market deposits and earn interest at floating rates based on prevailing bank base rates.

(ii) Market Price Risk

Changes in market prices other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk may also affect the value of the Company's net assets. The Company's exposure to changes in market prices relates to the fixed asset investments as disclosed in note 9.

The Board manages the market price risks inherent in the investment portfolio by ensuring full and timely access to relevant information from the Investment Manager. The Board meets regularly and at each meeting reviews investment performance, the investment portfolio and the rationale for the current investment positioning to ensure consistency with the Company's objectives and investment policies.

Currency Risk

Certain of the Company's assets, liabilities and income could be denominated in currencies other than sterling (the Company's functional currency and that in which it reports its results). Consequently, movements in exchange rates may affect the sterling value of those items.

Other Price Risk Sensitivity

A full list of the Company's investments is shown on pages 12 and 13. There is a concentration of exposure to the UK, though it should be noted that the Company's investment may not be entirely exposed to economic conditions in the UK, as many UK listed companies do much of their business overseas.

100% (2019 – 100%) of the Company's net assets are invested in quoted equities. A 10% increase in quoted equity valuations at 30 April 2020 would have increased total net assets and net return on ordinary activities after taxation by £25,979,000 (2019 – £30,021,000). A decrease of 10% would have had an equal but opposite effect.

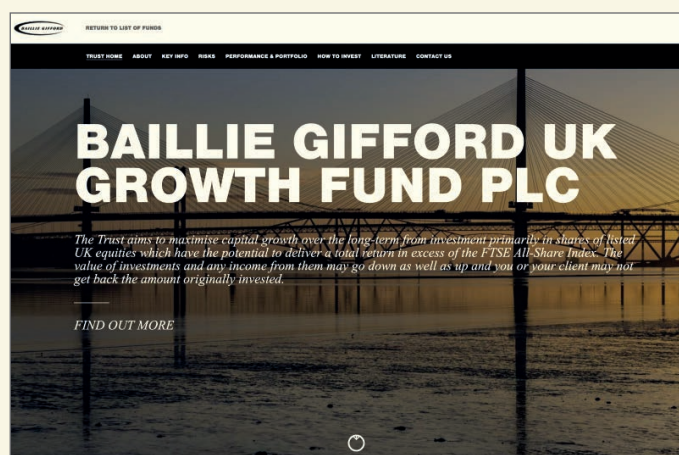

Total Assets

Total assets less current liabilities, before deduction of all borrowings.

Net Asset Value

Net Asset Value (NAV) is the value of total assets less liabilities (including borrowings). The NAV per share is calculated by dividing this amount by the number of ordinary shares in issue (excluding treasury shares).

Net Liquid Assets

Net liquid assets comprise current assets less current liabilities, excluding borrowings.

Discount/Premium (APM)

As stockmarkets and share prices vary, an investment trust's share price is rarely the same as its NAV. When the share price is lower than the NAV per share it is said to be trading at a discount. The size of the discount is calculated by subtracting the share price from the NAV per share and is usually expressed as a percentage of the NAV per share. If the share price is higher than the NAV per share, it is said to be trading at a premium.

Gearing (APM)

At its simplest, gearing is borrowing. Just like any other public company, an investment trust can borrow money to invest in additional investments for its portfolio. The effect of the borrowing on the shareholders' assets is called 'gearing'. If the Company's assets grow, the shareholders' assets grow proportionately more because the debt remains the same. But if the value of the Company's assets falls, the situation is reversed. Gearing can therefore enhance performance in rising markets but can adversely impact performance in falling markets.

Equity gearing is the Company's borrowings adjusted for cash and cash equivalents expressed as a percentage of shareholders' funds.

Potential gearing is the Company's borrowings expressed as a percentage of shareholders' funds.

The Company currently has no borrowings drawn down.

Leverage (APM)

For the purposes of the Alternative Investment Fund Managers (AIFM) Directive, leverage is any method which increases the Company's exposure, including the borrowing of cash and the use of derivatives. It is expressed as a ratio between the Company's exposure and its net asset value and can be calculated on a gross and a commitment method. Under the gross method, exposure represents the sum of the Company's positions after the deduction of sterling cash balances, without taking into account any hedging and netting arrangements. Under the commitment method, exposure is calculated without the deduction of sterling cash balances and after certain hedging and netting positions are offset against each other.

Active Share (APM)

Active share, a measure of how actively a portfolio is managed, is the percentage of the portfolio that differs from its comparative index. It is calculated by deducting from 100 the percentage of the portfolio that overlaps with the comparative index. An active share of 100 indicates no overlap with the index and an active share of zero indicates a portfolio that tracks the index.
